Alfalfa Update

2003 California Alfalfa & Forage Symposium:

December 17-19, 2003, Monterey, CA

Alfalfa butterflies: This was one of the worst outbreak years for these pests that I've seen. No one really knows why, but some speculate the cool spring negatively affected the beneficial insect wasps that feed on these caterpillars (wasps prefer warmer temperatures). The yellow butterflies are always males, but the females can be either white or yellow. Alfalfa caterpillar larvae overwinter in vetch, then adults move into alfalfa when the vetch dries down in the spring.


Water Quality Update

If you discharge irrigation or stormwater from your irrigated farmlands, by law you must obtain a waiver from the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB). If you do not obtain a waiver and discharge water from your farmlands you will be subject to fines from the SWRCB. A waiver may be obtained through joining a Watershed Group (contact your local Farm Bureau Office or Resource Conservation District) or you can submit your own request as an Individual Discharger. Both the Watershed Groups and Individual Dischargers must file a Notice of Intent with the SWRCB by November 1, 2003, to discharge under the conditions of a waiver. There is some discussion that the SWRCB may offer a "low threat" waiver next year for those farms that have crops with potentially low impacts on water quality (such as wheat, safflower, and organic production). 
Dry Bean Update

Last summer we conducted several *Lygus* control trials in kidneys and limas with WarriorT and MustangMax, in the Woodland area. These materials are NOT yet registered for pest control in dry beans, but should be by early 2004. Both materials provided good control of *Lygus* compared with the standard Dimethoate treatments. In limas, WarriorT provided excellent control of black bean aphids that were present in the field whereas MustangMax did not. WarriorT has some mite suppressive activity, but may or may not prevent outbreaks. Last I checked in one of our lima field plots the mites were building up where WarriorT was applied, but the field will likely be cut before economic injury occurs.

MustangMax tended to flare mites in limas, but not in our kidney trials. In preliminary water quality studies, MustangMax and WarriorT treated plots were clean in tailwater water samples (pyrethroids are non-soluble in water). Some Dimethoate was found in tailwater samples (OP's tend to be water soluble) but the levels were below the mortality levels for aquatic test species. The following graph describes the results of the insect data; insecticides were applied at labeled rates:



Adjacent graph: average number of Lygus (adults+nymphs)/sweep in KIDNEYS for 2 fields: Field #1 had <0.1 Lygus per sweep 5-days post treatment; Field #2 had '0' Lygus 10 and 19 days post treatment (no Lygus migrated in from surrounding fields).
